

Paul Newman once said, "I picture my epitaph: 'Here lies Paul Newman, who died a failure because his eyes turned brown." No doubt the film icon's unflinching blue eyes have been an asset, but, as the new book Paul Newman: A Life in Pictures demonstrates—in black-and-white as well as color photographs-Newman's charismatic persona is overpowering. The hardcover coffee-table picture book, edited by Pierre-Henri Verlhac and Yann-Brice Dherbier for Chronicle Books, was created with Newman's approval and contains hundreds of rare and never-before-seen photographs from both his Hollywood and racing careers as well as his private life and philanthropic efforts.
